What habits do super-agers possess?



When retirees meet on April 9 at 2 p.m., Michelle Miller, retired senior lecturer in the School of Public Health, will outline "The Seven Habits of Highly Effective Super-Agers." The session will be in the Peterson Room of the IU Foundation and on Zoom.

Michelle has worked in the field of movement for 30 years. She taught in IU's kinesiology department for 25 years, developing and directing an undergraduate degree curriculum for students to become health and fitness specialists. The owner of M&M Movement Training, she says, "My motto has been and continues to be, 'If we move well, we tend to move more.' For me this is key to maintaining quality of life."

Certified as an exercise physiologist by the American College of Sports Medicine, she has developed a curriculum to help build better balance. Michelle is a popular lecturer at IU's Mini University. Special guests will be members of the Senior Academy, the retiree association for Indiana University Indianapolis, who will be joining on Zoom.

Annual meeting slated for April 9

Before Michelle Miller's presentation on April 9, the IURA will hold a brief annual meeting. On the

agenda will be the election of four voting board members. IURA Vice President John Schilb chairs the nominating committee. Other members are Ken Beckley, Sally Dunn, and Diana Lambdin.

Nominees for three-year terms are Nan Brewer, Jan Hillier, and Gary Wiggins. Kip Smith is being nominated for a two-year term.

Nan Brewer retired in March 2024 as the Eskenazi Museum of Art's Lucienne M. Glaubinger Curator of Works on Paper. Working in the museum's curatorial department for 38 years, she organized almost 100 exhibitions, more than 120 in-gallery installations, and over 450 related programs. She also designed and managed the museum's Center for Prints, Drawings and Photographs. She has written and lectured on IU's artistic history and legacy.

After earning her MBA and PhD from the Kelley School of Business, **Jan Hillier** served on the faculty in the department of management and entrepreneurship from 2009 to 2019, teaching undergraduate, graduate, and online courses. She also taught the required "Managing Business Functions" class in the Liberal Arts Management Program (LAMP) and a leadership seminar at Hutton Honors College. Jan retired in May 2019.

Gary Wiggins earned four degrees from IU, including a master's degree in Slavic languages and literature. In 1976 he became head of the chemistry library and director of the Chemical Information Center. He also taught the literature of science and technology course in the School of Library and Information Science. In 2003 he became director of the cheminformatics and bioinformatics programs in the School of Informatics. Gary retired in 2007.

Kip Smith joined IU's athletics staff as head football trainer in 1983 and became head athletic trainer in 1987, while also serving as wrestling athletic trainer. He taught in the athletic training education program and administered the athletic sports medicine program. Kip also provided health and safety services as a medical observer for concussion injuries of football players for IU and for the Indianapolis Colts. He retired in 2014.

Four people are leaving the board. **Joyce Krothe** has completed two terms on the IURA board and is ineligible for reelection. **Anita Douglas** resigned in December 2024 "in anticipation of moving from our wonderful community, my home for the past 30-plus years." **Beau Vallance** has chosen not to seek reelection to a second term. **Perry Metz**, elected last year, is resigning because his travel schedule prevents his participation in IURA activities.

A look inside newly created museum



Archaeology and Anthropology was closed for spring break, but on March 19 it opened to give about 40 IURA members an inside view. Sarah Junk Hatcher, the museum's learning and communications engagement manager, talked about the backstory in merging the former Glenn Black Laboratory of Archaeology

IU's Museum of

and the former Mathers Museum of World Cultures.

In the fall of 2019, President Michael McRobbie announced the merger, and museum staffs began packing 5.5 million artifacts and 28,000 objects before they had to vacate the facility in September 2020. The pandemic interrupted those plans, but in

May 2020, staff were given permission to re-enter, along with what Sarah called "an amazing crew of students."

Retirees asked about repatriation of objects. Repatriation of human remains is required by law, Sarah said, but the museum has embraced the spirit as well as the letter of the law and returned objects with spiritual significance to their original owners. On May 31 the museum will memorialize the "City on the River," popularly called Angel Mounds, celebrating the people who lived and worked there.

Another questioner asked how anthropology museum collections differ from those in art museums. Sarah deferred to **Beau Vallance**, her former professor, who suggested that anthropology museums exhibit objects in contexts that tell the stories of cultures while art museums typically explore artistic styles and materials.

Sarah introduced retirees to current exhibits. In the photo at left, she stands before a flag that is part of the "Through Our Eyes: A Reclamation" exhibit. Three Indigenous guest curators presented an Indigenous perspective of the experiences depicted in early 20th-century photography.

Free to wander, some, like **Sandra Churchill** in the photo below, explored textiles in the collection — major exhibit of Islamic textiles is included — while others chose to observe a huge video installation that shows the border from both the U.S. and Mexican sides.



Sarah invited retirees to celebrate spring at the museum. The April 10 event, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., will feature plant-centered activities and good food.

Conversation + Dessert coming in May

May luncheon scheduled for Meadowood

On May 14, retirees and their guests will celebrate the end of the academic year with a special luncheon buffet in Meadowood's Terrace Room.
